2.1 Title

Housing and Neighbourhoods Reconstruction Support

2.2 Description

The post-earthquake housing reconstruction program in Haiti will be quite different from those that have been carried out after large-scale disasters in other countries. These differences have to do with the nature of the disaster event and the socioeconomic situation in Haiti, and with the institutional arrangements through which housing reconstruction will take place. These differences therefore require a unique response by the government.

In most recent, large-scale reconstruction programs, government has controlled the majority of the resources for housing reconstruction and could dictate the terms under which they were spent. In Haiti, the neighbourhood return and housing reconstruction effort will be extremely decentralized and carried out by a wide range of reconstruction actors (public, private, and non-governmental). A large portion of the funds pledged to earthquake reconstruction will be spent directly by these agencies, according to their own institutional policies.

There are both opportunities and risks associated with this approach. The Neighbourhood Return and Housing Reconstruction Framework developed by the IHRC for government in collaboration with international agencies identifies these issues and proposes mitigation measures. The risks include potential for gaps in the overall results, lack of accountability to intended beneficiaries, and the creation of greater social inequities. For those reasons, it is essential that government be equipped with information and systems that will allow it to plan and monitor the reconstruction effort, in collaboration with key partner agencies. The Housing and Neighbourhoods Reconstruction Support Programme is intended to provide some of the most basic tools that will allow government, the IHRC, and their partners to manage these risks and optimize the use of pledged resources. The programme supported by a consortium of UN partners provides the Government of Haiti with needed services to coordinate reconstruction (data, tracking, and institutional strengthening and resources for various ministries and local authorities).

Community Resource Centers will provide specific space for the youth. The project will also support community outreach and consultations with communities through youth organisations to ensure that the planned Community Resource Centers take youth priorities and services into account.

At the project level, procedures will be agreed on for environmental review between UN Habitat and GOH, as well as involved agencies, especially the communes, and incorporated in the project's Operations Manual. In strategic and urban planning, municipal profiles will prioritize activities associated with environmental management and related risks and opportunities, given the urgent environmental situation in Haiti and the importance of the municipal role. Restructuring plans will also identify risks-mitigation measures to be implemented in neighbourhoods and specific actions aimed to improve access to basic services (water, sanitation and solid waste management), create green urban areas and revitalise the ravines' banks. This will constitute a solid basis for longer term strategic environmental planning. UNEP will provide support in bringing environmental expertise to the whole planning processes.

8. Local Community Support

8.1 Local Community Support

On-going initiatives aiming to support the return to safe houses and neighbourhoods have established social mobilization and participatory mechanisms targeting communities living in precarious neighbourhoods. The project will systematize, further develop, and replicate those mechanisms so as to ensure a full and active participation from the concerned communities. Community Resource Centers will be set up in selected neighbourhoods and will further facilitate social mobilization and participation. Community planning guidelines will also assist in putting the communities in the driver's seat for the restructuring and reconstruction activities.

9. Monitoring Process

9.1 Anti-corruption mechanism

Selection of partners and service providers will be in accordance with the project operations manual, and reviewed by the Steering Committee that will be comprised of representatives of the Inter-Ministerial Committee on Housing (MSA, MPCE, MTPTC, MITC, MT), involved municipalities and concerned international agencies (UN-Habitat, IOM, UNFPA, UNDP, UNEP, UNICEF) in line with their respective contractual and procurement modalities.

Contracts with NGOs and private firms involved in the project will include codes of conduct and/or a request for evidence of the organization's involvement in integrity pacts.

Each agency will establish mechanisms for the purpose of monitoring and evaluation and will require regular audits and financial reports, and technical progress reports for cross-checking with information collected from the field by the evaluation and monitoring teams and the central and local governments.

9.2 Project monitoring process

Given the importance of this project to the Government of Haiti and the IHRC's reconstruction monitoring and planning, the project will be guided by a letter agreement and operations manual agreed between UN Habitat, the Interministerial Housing Commission (MSA, MPCE, MTPTC, MITC, MT), and the IHRC.

A Steering Committee comprised of the Inter-Ministerial Housing Commission and the IHRC (or its successor agency), as well as involved municipalities and concerned international agencies (UN-Habitat, IOM, UNFPA, UNDP, UNEP, UNICEF) will be established. The Steering Committee will be responsible for the overall monitoring of the project and will meet on a quarterly basis. The project teams of implementing agencies (UN-HABITAT, IOM, UNFPA, UNDP, UNEP, UNICEF) will undertake regular field visits to analyze and further share the state of progress and difficulties encountered. Similarly, the project will be subject to quarterly progress reports that will be prepared based on monthly financial and technical reports provided by implementing partners. In addition to providing the basis for the reconstruction monitoring system required by the government and the IHRC, the project will contribute best practices and ongoing support to the updating of the IHRC housing reconstruction guidelines.

Project reviews will be conducted on a bi-yearly basis of detailed documentation in order to reorient project as required. The project will undergo a final review involving all partners. A final technical and financial report will be presented three months after the closing date of the project.
