### **PROGRAM OBJECTIVE**

This project aims to facilitate the rehabilitation and reconstruction of sixteen neighborhoods (Morne Hercule, Morne Lazard, Nerette, Delmas 60 Argentine, Panaméricaine Haute, Panaméricaine Bas. Morne et Villa Rosa, Bas Canape Vert, Bois Patate, Jean Baptiste, Mont Elbo et Mapou) through the rehabilitation of housing, provision of some basic services as prioritized by the community and by creating income-generating opportunities. At the same time, the project aims to facilitate the return of displaced persons in six priority camps, currently hosting 5.239 households to their district of origin in one of these sixteen neighborhoods spread over the municipalities of Port-au-Prince, Pétionville and Delmas.

This project is in line with the Neighborhood Return and Housing Reconstruction Framework developed by the IHRC in collaboration with the government and international agencies.

# DESCRIPTION

## The project aims to ensure that:

- The displaced find a lasting housing solution;
- The return to the neighborhoods of origin is facilitated by the reconstruction of quality housing;
- An improved rehabilitation of the 16 districts of origin is undertaken on the basis of the priorities identified by the community;
- The capacity of the Haitian actors is strengthened such that they can carry out reconstruction in Haiti by applying the model of the 16 districts

## **Direct beneficiaries**

- 28 216 families in the neighborhoods (basic and social services)
- 7 706 families in the neighborhoods (damaged houses)
- 5239 families in the camps

The return to neighborhoods will be facilitated by providing return benefits to displaced families, and rental subsidies or repair/reconstruction grants in line with quality standards and safety requirements to displaced families and an equivalent number of vulnerable families living in the neighborhoods of return. The project also plans to support and train professionals and SMEs active in the local construction industry. Coordination and smooth implementation of the project will be ensured by creating community, camp and neighborhood platforms and will be supported by a targeted communication strategy.
